Behavioral Issue: Writes and passes notes

Objective:

- Students will identify their disrespectful behavior.
- Students will understand the importance of discontinuing their disruptive actions.

Materials:

The Kacklin' Kitchen by Julie Woik Print out the form that correlates with this lesson

Activity:

Read The Kacklin' Kitchen with the child or children who are participating in this activity. After the reading, talk about the different ways in which Mookee MaGee was disrespectful to others in the kitchen. Discuss other ways disrespect is shown. Point out that writing and passing notes in class is very disrespectful. Help the child understand how they're actions are affecting the focus and flow of the classroom, and how rude and disruptive it is to the teacher. Have the child commit to refraining from writing/passing notes. The calendar will keep them on track. Let the child paste Happy Faces on the days that they make the right choice to be respectful!!

Assessment:

Students will realize how their behavior affects themselves and others in the classroom. They'll recognize the positive aspect of conducting themselves appropriately, and will gain self-respect through making good decisions.
